

THINGS TO TRY AT HOME!!!

During this time of year, who couldn't benefit from having a few helpful tips or strategies to try? The holidays are not an uncommon time for individuals to experience, unwelcomed stress, conflict, anger, sadness and grief. Here are a few suggestions to help encourage positive well-being: set boundaries (discuss expectations ahead of time, set time limits for activities), get into a routine (create balance, plan ahead), brainstorm positive outlets for stress relief before it strikes (physical activity, connecting with friends, mindfulness practices), Reflect [acknowledge your accomplishments both big and small, set SMART goals (specific, measurable, attainable, relevant, and timely)] and most of all make time for yourself (quiet time, hobbies or even something new).

Vestment and Altar Colors:

GREEN: color of life and hope. Used for Ordinary Time

RED: color symbolizing fire, love, blood. Used for celebrations of the Holy Spirit (i.e., Pentecost), celebrations of the Passion of Christ and for those daily Masses which honor martyrs.

WHITE: sign of purity, innocence, triumph and glory. Used for the seasons of Christmas and Easter; for Feasts of the Lord not associated with His Passion; for All Saints' Day, wedding Masses and for the funerals of children who have not reached the age of reason.

VIOLET: (Purple) symbol of penance and humility but also of kingship. Used in Advent and Lent.

ROSE: used only two Sundays of the Year, part-way through Advent and part-way through Lent. Sign of a "'lightening" of the seriousness of the season, a sign of joy that is to come.

BLACK: used occasionally for All Souls' Day and for Masses for the dead (Requiem Masses).

BLUE may be used for celebrations of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

GOLD may be used in place of white, red or green, and is most often seen in the vestments used on Holy Thursday for Adoration and Benediction.

SOLEMNITIES are the highest celebrations and include all Sundays and Holy Days. The Gloria and the Creed are included in these Masses. **FEASTS** are second in importance; the Gloria is included in Mass.
